



## Robert "Bob" Lloyd Hall

June 29, 1934 - June 30, 2025

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Robert "Bob" Lloyd Hall passed away peacefully on June 30, 2025, just one day after his 91st birthday. He was born in Stillwater, Oklahoma on June 29, 1934, to Lyle and Irene Hall and was the oldest of their three children. He was a loving brother to Gayle L. Hall and June Hall Kyker and cherished the roots of his Oklahoma upbringing throughout his life.

Lovingly known as Bob to friends and family, he was known for his warmth, his steady presence, and the unforgettable hugs he offered to anyone in need. His kindness was effortless and constant, and his joy in connecting with others left a lasting impact on everyone who knew him.

Bob proudly served in the United States Army from 1954 to 1956, rising to the rank of Sergeant First Class. The values he carried from military service—discipline, humility, and loyalty—shaped his character and approach to life.

After returning home, Bob earned a degree in Mechanical Engineering from Oklahoma State University and began his professional journey with Conoco in 1960 in Ponca City, Oklahoma. He worked his way from a refinery engineer to the position of Purchasing Director. After retiring early in 1985, he continued to

lend his expertise at John Brown Engineering. He was respected for his problem-solving mind, fairness, and calm leadership.

In 1953, Bob married his high school sweetheart, Patricia "Patty" A. McGinn. Their marriage of 35 years was filled with laughter, partnership, and a shared love of dancing. Together, they were longtime members of the Hey Lollies Square Dance group, where they made many dear friends. After Patty's passing, Bob later married Judith "Judy" Webber Hall in 1989, with whom he shared 30 more joyful years. Bob later introduced Judy to the square dance group, which became an important part of their life together as well.

Bob was preceded in death by his wife Patty, his wife Judy, his brother Gayle, his sister June, and his beloved son, Michael W. Hall. He was also preceded in death by his stepson, Charles F. Webber, Jr.

He is survived by his daughter, Lori Hall Endsley. He is also survived by his stepchildren, Lydia Webber Harrington and her husband Dennis and George Webber and his wife Vanessa. Bob was a devoted grandfather to Seth and Ryan Endsley, Madeline, Paul, and Lisa Harrington, and Elena and Sam Webber. His family brought him immense pride and joy, and he took an active, loving interest in their lives.

Bob and his family moved to Houston, Texas in 1970, where he built a life full of purpose and connection. In 1991, he and Judy moved to Galveston, where he found peace in bay fishing and cherished time on the water. In 2006, they returned to Houston, where Bob became a beloved resident of The Buckingham Senior Living Center.

Whether he was dancing, fishing, working, or simply listening to music, Bob found joy in the everyday.

He will be remembered as a kind and loving man who brought light and comfort to others through his steady spirit and generous heart. Bob's legacy lives on in the family he cherished, the friendships he nurtured, and the many lives he touched through a life lived with gratitude, warmth, and love.
